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Welcome to the April issue of The Village Voice




Arboriculturists expected are to descend on Chilmark in coming weeks following the remarkable discovery of a previously unidentified species of tree. The tree was spotted by a passing expert who has provided us with photographic evidence but for the time being wishes the tree's location to remain undisclosed until a formal identification has taken place. We understand the tree is of the Ivy genus and is likely to be named Hedera pinus. Scientists are particularly excited because the tree appears to be disease resistant but also tolerant of climate both extremes, thriving in wet conditions and periods of drought. Hence, its future role in the world as we enter a period of climate crisis could be of huge significance. Once formal identification has taken place, we understand that an urgent propagation programme will be recommended to ensure the new species' future. Something for Chilmark to be very proud of!

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Parish Council News

Chilmark Parish Council met on Wednesday 6 March with more than 20 members of the public in attendance.

School Playing Field

Several residents attended the PC meeting to learn of progress on the School Playing Field fencing situation. As reported in the March issue of the Village Voice, the PC was expecting an update from Chilmark School / the Salisbury Diocesan Board of Education (SDBE) as to whether Wiltshire Council would require a planning application for the proposed new fencing round the Field at Claybush. The meeting heard that no update had been received. Given nearly six months have elapsed since the unannounced fencing works began, the VV approached the SDBE for a comment. Schools Estates Manager Olivia Evans said: There are elements of the proposed works that do need planning permission and others that don't. The SDBE is involved in ongoing discussions with the Parish Council and there will be a further update in May. Editor's note: Watch this space!

Barn Hill Parking

Also present at the meeting were those concerned about chronic parking shortages in the Barn Hill / Hops Close area of the village. The PC heard that parking at the top of Hops Close had become extremely difficult as most houses had 2 or 3 cars and yet insufficient spaces allocated. Double parking was taking place and delivery drivers were using private driveways. It was only a matter of time before cars were damaged. The situation was particularly difficult for elderly residents in the Barn Hill bungalows, with nowhere for visitors to park and no access for emergency services. PC Chair Sir Richard Packer noted that the problem was a result of houses being built without knowledge of future car ownership. There was significant under provision of parking spaces and this had been exacerbated by the fence erected alongside the driveway to the property Cheriton. Cllr Carl Jacobs noted that Wiltshire had now surveyed the road up to Barn Hill with a view to it being adopted as a Highway; it is currently a Byway. Once adopted, it was hoped it would be possible to explore the creation of extra parking spaces. Meanwhile, residents were urged to report any potholes on the MyWiltsApp. One resident had been injured after she fell as a result of a pothole.

Black Dog Working Party

BDWP member Martyn Simpson explained that the Working Party's offer to purchase the pub and its whole site had been turned down and the owner had countered the offer with a higher figure but excluding part of the site from the proposed sale. The Working Party would only be able to apply for funding for the purchase once an offer had been accepted. Meanwhile, the owner's planning application to fell Ash Trees on the site had been withdrawn; a further application was expected in due course. Ten of the 20 objections to the application had come from Working Party members. BDWP fundraising would continue.

Wessex Internet

Mungo Melvin reported that 42 homes in the village now have active accounts with Wessex Internet although a total of 108 properties could be connected, should the householders wish to sign up to the service. The current take-up rate in Chilmark is 26%, set against Wessex's target of 40%. Wessex said it will be implementing another *push* to see an uptick in orders and registrations in the village.

Chilmark War Memorial

The Parochial Church Council had pointed out that remedial work is required to the War Memorial in Chilmark Churchyard. The memorial is Grade II listed and so specialist work would be required and it was understood the Parish Council might be asked to make a contribution.

Litter Bins

Councillors heard that a litter bin for Forbes Field had been purchased out of Forbes Field funds and would be positioned near the entrance to Forbes Field. The PC would pay for it to be emptied once a month. Meanwhile, the dog poo bin at Mooray was filling up fast despite being emptied twice monthly. Councillors discussed the possibility of purchasing a bigger bin for the site but it could prove expensive. The Chair noted that the amount use it was getting indicated it was having a positive effect on the environment in that part of the village.

Flooding Issues

Cllr Carl Jacobs, Flood Warden, noted that while groundwater levels remained high the big problem in recent weeks had been the inundation of sewers with floodwater. The result was a mixture of floodwater and diluted sewage backing up out of manhole covers in parts of The Street. One resident asked if it would be possible in future to warn residents of the sewage escape, given the proximity of the school and the number of dog walkers using the route. Cllr CJ said Wessex Water had been proactive and were doing the best they could. They had recently jetted through the sewerage system in The Street and this had alleviated the problem.

Traffic Survey Results

The PC had received the results of the latest two traffic surveys on the Tisbury Road and the Fovant Road, both of which are subject to 60mph speed limits. The Tisbury Road survey, near the entrance to Eyewell Farm, had revealed an average speed of 34mph. The Fovant Road survey, by Portash, showed an average speed of 24mph. It was agreed on the basis of these results that Wiltshire Highways was unlikely to recommend any speed reduction measures.

Annual Assembly / Next PC Meeting

The Annual Assembly will take place on Wednesday 8 May, 7pm in the Reading Room, followed immediately by the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council.


Village Litter Pick

Chilmark Cricket Club



Salisbury Diocese Finances

The Salisbury Diocese is responsible for 432 parishes. Those parishes are primarily in Wiltshire and Dorset but they also include the Channel Islands. The Diocese charges fees to each parish; that income is known as Share. The calculation of Share is loosely based on the numbers of people who worship regularly and/or contribute financially to the work of the church. Parish Share contributions go mainly towards the cost of clergy salaries.

In our local area, 14 parishes are rolled up into the Nadder Valley Benefice. There is no financial hierarchy and no one is empowered to tell each parish what to do. Effectively, commercially, each parish runs itself and sends in the results of their efforts to the Diocese. In our Benefice we had three full-time clergy but in January this was reduced to two. Obviously, this type of flat organisation would not succeed in the commercial world. No company runs with 432 tiny subsidiaries all repeating the administration and financial management in so many tiny outposts, it makes absolutely no sense. The Diocese is very capital rich and in the last published accounts showed assets of £128m. They do not hold much of that capital in cash or near liquid assets; cashflow is difficult. They are losing money on a year-by-year basis and are having to sell capital assets to make ends meet.

The Diocese requested Share of £13.8m in 2022 and not all of it was paid; we (Chilmark) are not alone in being unable to meet our Share request. They spent £15m and lost £1.4m in 2022. That followed on from a loss in 2021 of £1.5m and a predicted loss for 2023 of £1.6m. In 2024 they have suggested that if everyone paid 8% more by way of Share then the losses will be eliminated but things are not that simple, as the unpaid Share was not factored into that calculation. They have also introduced an element of relief for parishes unable to pay their Share. That was not factored into the break-even pronouncement either. They will likely lose money again in 2024.

At the Church Commissioner level, funds are bountiful. They have over £10 billion in reserves. They see themselves as an endowment fund. They successfully generated £900m in 2023 in investment gains.The relationship between the Church Commissioner funds and the Church of England (on the ground and in the parishes) is far from straight forward. It is not a parent organisation in the normal commercial sense. Nevertheless, some of that income will be used to support failing Dioceses, but Salisbury is not considered to be a failing Diocese. There are 42 Dioceses around the country and many of them are in a far worse state than Salisbury. **Johan Denekamp**

Tisbury Surgery News

A patient enquired recently how Tisbury Surgery is funded. That's not an easy question to answer but we thought it might be of interest to give a basic outline of how funding for GP practices (*primary care*) as opposed to hospitals (*secondary care*) works. Over 90% of initial patient contacts with the NHS are made via general practice for which we receive around 8% of total NHS funding.

Tisbury Surgery is an independent business and, like most GP practices, is contracted to provide services to the NHS under the GMS (General Medical Services) contract and this governs how we deliver *core* medical services. The practice receives around £100 per annum for each registered patient – irrespective of how many times a patient is seen.

This amount needs to cover the cost of the surgery premises, which must be financed and maintained, staff, light and heating bills (which we all know about only too well) along with staff training, insurance, healthcare supplies, medical and office equipment and all the other paraphernalia involved in running a business. These costs are NOT covered by any NHS bodies.

Surgeries may opt to provide additional services and here at Tisbury Surgery we offer, for instance, NHS health checks, coil and implant clinics, vaccination services, and participate in training new registrars (the GPs of the future), and much more, for which we are funded separately although some of these services are now under threat due to changes being made by our Integrated Care Board in the next financial year. These services need to be funded separately to allow us to employ staff with specialist knowledge and to purchase the required medical items to provide the services.

Simply put, the Practice must cover its costs in order to provide a service. We therefore charge, for instance, for firearms certificates and insurance reports. These are not covered by the GMS contract and mean that a clinician needs to dedicate time over and above his usual work to complete these tasks.

We are hugely fortunate at Tisbury to have wonderful staff – either seen or unseen by patients – who do their best to provide an excellent service, led by Dr Adam Smith. We would like to thank all the patients who bear with us when the computers crash, or we are training new staff, or are faced with the unplanned departure of a registrar and consequent loss of around 90 appointments a week! Then, just add in the *winter pressures* and increased demand! This makes it even more important, PLEASE, that you cancel your appointment if you need to do so, as we have an ever-increasing number of *Do Not Attends* – therefore restricting access for other patients. **Rosie Eacott**, Practice Manager


Ansty May Day

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Tisbury Fire Station Needs Your Help

Can you Respond?

Tisbury fire station are looking for four new recruits to join their team. We've got a great team here at Tisbury, but we don't have enough people to provide cover all the time. We have had occasions where our neighbouring stations at Shaftesbury and Mere have had to come into Tisbury and surrounding villages to deal with incidents because we've not had enough crew available. We have particular challenges on weekdays and at weekends, and more recruits would help fill those gaps.

Our new station commander, Sarah, is really keen that we get the word out to encourage people to consider becoming an on-call firefighter. Providing cover doesn't mean sitting at the fire station, it's about having a pager and being able to respond when it goes off. You do need to be within a reasonable distance from the station, but you know when you are on-call and can manage your time accordingly. We have firefighters currently responding from Teffont, Hindon and Tisbury so you don't have to live just in Tisbury to respond.

Lots of on-call firefighters respond from work during the day. I'd urge anyone interested in joining the Service to have a chat with their employer to see if they would support this. As well as giving the local community their help, they would benefit from all the training that's provided. As firefighters we learn advanced first aid, leadership skills, health & safety knowledge and sometimes even gain an LGV licence!

We've got two recruitment events coming up, on Wednesday 24 April between 5.30pm and 8.30pm, and then on Saturday 27 April between 10am and 2pm. We'd love to see anyone interested in supporting the local community by being an on-call firefighter, come along and have a chat!

From the Police & Crime Commissioner

Villages and Rural areas not immune to threat of Child Exploitation

I was astonished to learn recently that those criminal gangs who groom and exploit children and young people to carry out criminal activities on their behalf are now using virtual rewards to take advantage of them. This takes the form of credit in online video games, so no longer should parents only be on the lookout for new trainers, designer clothes and expensive technology if they're worried their child is being exploited, but also online enticements such as avatars and virtual currency.

Children and young people are especially vulnerable to being exploited by criminal gangs because of their age and the harm caused to themselves, their families and their communities can be devastating with violent incidents often escalating. That's why my office has backed the *Check Your Children* campaign developed by Owen's World, a charity set up by family and friends following the death of Owen Dunn who was fatally stabbed in Swindon in December 2022. Owen was carrying a knife at the time of the stabbing, and now his family are asking parents and guardians to look out for any signs that their children may be involved in knife or gang crime.

We've developed a video to explain the signs of exploitation, the reality of serious violence in Wiltshire and where they can seek further guidance and advice if they're concerned. We often think of drug and knife crime happening in our city and bigger towns, but our villages and more rural areas are not immune from the threat of county lines and serious violence, and sadly nor are the children and young people that live there.

So, my plea to parents, guardians, grandparents, and other caregivers, please *Check your Children*, don't shy away from asking the difficult questions of your children and seeking support from schools, police, Crimestoppers and the NSPCC if you need it.
