No lettering of the memorial shall be recut until the extent of work necessary has been established and the local planning authority has confirmed in writing that it is acceptable. Reason: in order to preserve the original lettering and fabric of the memorial.

It was also noted that a *Faculty* from the Salisbury Diocese will be required before the work can be carried out.

80th Anniversary of VE Day Celebrations

During the late afternoon of Thursday 8 May, about 80 people gathered in Forbes Field to celebrate VE 80, eighty years to the day of the German

unconditional surrender, bringing an end to the Second World War in Europe. Blessed by warm early summer weather, serenaded by some contemporary 1940s swing music and fortified by great food and drinks from the BBQ and bar run by the Reading Room Committee, a really good time was had by young and old alike. The event was open to all from Chilmark and Teffont: from the latter, we welcomed David Robinson who brought along his immaculately restored WWII Willis Jeep.



An undoubted highlight of the celebration was the playback of an extract of Prime Minister Winston Churchill's memorable radio broadcast to the nation on 8 May 1945, which was followed by me giving a short speech to honour the fallen and to stress the contemporary relevance of the nation's *fight against tyranny*. We then awarded themed prizes such as spam and camp coffee to the gentlemen and ladies who wore the most convincing WWII costumes.



We would like to thank all who made this such a successful event. In particular, we are very grateful to Carl Jacobs of the Cricket Club (tents); Henrietta Cockrell, Becky Lee, Alison Whipp-Long, Rich Mann and Dathan Trent of the Reading Room Committee (bar and BBQ); Heidi MacCormack and Neil Pattenden of the Forbes Field Management Group (prizes and bunting); and last, but by no means least, Janie Whipp of both the Reading Room Committee and the Forbes Field Management Group, who organised and coordinated the whole event with Alison Whipp-Long.





In sum, I think we can all be proud of our VE 80 celebration in Forbes Field, which is becoming a valued community asset. As one senior resident noted, it was 'wonderful to see all the trees coming into leaf and growing so well. Chilmark is a remarkable village.' So do make good use of the Field in the future: it is open to all to enjoy. Diana Forbes, who so kindly donated her field to the village in 2008, would surely endorse that message.

VE Day Memories

Our thanks to Anne McGrail for sharing her memories of the first VE Day, 80 years ago.

I was 15 years old when WW2 ended in 1945. We were living in a tiny village in Devon. Celebrations for VE Day were rather subdued. A party in the vicarage garden – fish paste sandwiches, cupcakes with hundreds & thousands sprinkled on them and orangeade for the children. No dancing in the streets or raucous parties. We were all aware that the hardest part of the war was still to come, especially because my father Rowland was in the army in Burma. He did not come home until July 1946; we had not seen him for nearly seven years. He remained a

withdrawn and solitary figure until his death 30 years later.

The chief change to life after VE day that I remember was the lifting of the Blackout. For five and a half years it had been illegal to show the smallest chink of light from windows and doors which were shrouded in heavy blackout curtains. Air Raid Wardens would come round regularly and bang on the door if a light was showing; you could be fined. Now all that had changed, as Vera Lynn sang When the Lights go on All Over the World.

June in the Garden

All the roses should be coming into flower now, and there are lots to see around the village. If, like me, your

around the village. If, like me, your roses are eaten by deer, the RHS recommend interplanting with strong scented plants like lavender. I may well give that a try this year.

Have you put up any shading in your greenhouse? We have tried both shade paint and shade netting and they definitely seem to help keep the temperature down a little. It will also be time to pinch out side shoots on cordon tomatoes. If the side shoots are three or four inches long, you can try potting them up in small pots of peat-free compost. Tomato plants for free!

Don't forget to stake any tall perennials, ideally before they get too floppy. There are all sorts of ring and grow-through supports available to buy online or at the garden centre, but the wise amongst you (sadly not me as I forgot) will have saved prunings from dogwoods cut back earlier in the year.

The weather has been lovely for a few weeks now, but this means it is very dry, so we are all busy watering. When water is short, we're advised to focus on plants in containers, and those newly planted this year.

Hope you're all getting pleasure from your gardens, especially with the light evenings.

C Chilmark Cricket Club latest

April wrapped up with a T20 fixture at Donheads. The hosts were good enough to lend a few players to make up for a Chilmark squad largely unwilling to do it on a sunny Wednesday evening in Ludwell. But it was one of those that was, that scored the runs. George Stevenson continued his superb early season form by bashing the ball around the park and then retiring. In his place came the next new thing from the assembly line of Chilmark talent, in Seb Trent. Batting for the first time for the senior team, the youngster showed no nerves as he hooked, drove and defended his way to seven valuable runs. With Ricky Corbin (11) and Brand King (10*) chipping in, Chilmark put on a solid 99 in the 20 overs.

Stevenson was as effective with ball as he was with the bat, taking a wicket and going for just 11 runs in his four overs. Sam Moss (0-21) then had a rare wicketless outing, but the co-coach of the junior club got to watch one of his proteges, in Trent, bowl a great first ever spell for the seniors. Sending down loopy leg spinners as if such things were easy, his four overs, which included a maiden, went

for just 15 runs. Though his spell was done, Trent's contributions weren't, as he fielded swiftly at third man and fired a throw in to help effect a run out. Brand King then came on to take two quick wickets and put the game to bed.

Chilmark CC 99-5 (G Stevenson 33*; R Corbin 11) defeated Donheads CC 79-5 (B King 2-2; G Stevenson 1-11)

Newcomers to Cleeves Farm, Urchfont CC were in town next for the first Sunday afternoon game of the year. Ricky Corbin (5) came and went, while Jonny Sanderson (11) again looked good, only to fall victim to one that kept low. When Brand King then went for a third ball duck there were fears of a classic Chilmarkian collapse. However, Sam Packer and Max Allen had other ideas, as they put on a blistering 167 run stand. Both batsmen retired after reaching their centuries, leaving Ed Lewis (4), Sam Moss (22), Darren Lee (17) and Seb Trent (6*) to bolster the total.

Chasing 299 for victory was always going to be a challenge for Urchfont but whenever King (1-33) attempted to bowl his slower ball they usually got six runs closer. Revenge eventually came though, thanks to a low catch at slip by Corbin, whose own bowling (0-12) was parsimonious. Sam Moss (1-26) kept the foot on Urchfont's larynx, while Ed Lewis (0-43) made up for his expensive bowling by taking three catches. Darren Lee benefited from one of those, but it was Seb Trent's first over at his home ground that got the crowd on their feet. With his second ball, a perfectly pitched leg spinner, he had the batsman mishit one straight to the reliable mitts of Corbin at mid-wicket. Two balls later he spun one through the gate, before rounding out the over with a third wicket, thanks to a nice one-handed catch by Lewis at backward square leg. With that, the game was all but done. The Doc chipped in with a late wicket, and there was a run out that is best not described to save the blushes of all involved, as Chilmark got home with 140 runs to spare.

Chilmark CC 298-6 (M Allen 100*; S Packer 100*) defeated Urchfont CC 159-9 (S Trent 3-12; D Lee 2-19)

Fonthill Park then arrived at Cleeves Farm for the second leg of this season's local derby. Bowling first, Chilmark had early success when George Stevenson ripped out the opener's middle stump. He then had Fonthill's number three jumping around with a few spicy deliveries, including one that left a nice purple mark on his chest. But that seemed to unleash the beast. The batter put together a blistering 151 as he pushed Fonthill to an eye-watering score of 316. Chilmark skipper Ned Pattenden tried every bowler in his team that wasn't wearing the 'keeper's pads to stem the flow, but other than four wickets for Sam Moss, and a couple for Rocket (2-30), it was not a good day for the bowling averages.

Expectations were muted when Chilmark's openers went out to start the chase. But runs came early. Brand King (12) raced out of the blocks, then yorked himself trying to

defend, before Darren Lee and Ed Lewis launched a counter-attack. When Lee (34) was caught by Ash the fishmonger on the boundary, George Stevenson arrived to increase the rate further. His innings featured seven consecutive boundaries as Chilmark hearts dared to dream. But when he was bowled, and then his dad, Rocket (3), was run out, thoughts turned to the leftover cakes in the club kitchen instead. But new bat Marin Chalavatzis was having none of it. Combining with Lewis for a 107-run stand, the pair took the game to Fonthill and kept the unlikely target within reach. When Chalavatzis (34) was caught on the boundary, Chilmark were within 73 runs of victory with seven overs remaining. Alas, it was too much for the tail, as the pressure of the total finally told. Jez Howell (0) was caught short trying to push his rickety knees for a second two in as many balls, Pattenden (1) lost his stumps, Seb Trent (0) went a similar way after dancing down the pitch, and Sam Moss (7) was run out by his son James (1*), who bravely batted despite copping a powerfully struck ball on his leg earlier in the day. They stuck around long enough to help Lewis to a 72-ball century though, to put a silver lining on a hard-fought defeat.

In Memory of Joan Edney

We were sad to learn of the death of Joan Edney, aged 92, who lived in Hops Close, Chilmark, for much her life until 2022 when she moved to be near her son Andrew. A grandmother, and great grandmother, Joan was brought up in Weymouth during WW2 where, as children, they used to climb though the beach defences to swim.

Married to Peter Edney, they initially live in Semley where Peter was a shepherd. When ill health overtook him in the early 1970s, they moved with their three children to Hops Close; Peter died aged 41 in 1976. Joan was admired for her energy as she became a busy village resident, involved in many societies and activities, including the choir and CADS (Chilmark Amateur Dramatic Society) and bellringing. She was a member of the then thriving WI and the Mothers' Union and also a long-serving member of the PCC as well as a governor at Chilmark School, where she read with the children.

In 1980, for the 700th anniversary of Chilmark Church, Joan was on the Festival of Flowers & Music Committee and was one of 29 residents providing flower arrangements for the event. A stalwart member of the Village Voice distribution team, and its predecessor Church & Village, Joan helped with numerous church fete teas and she was famed for her Carrot & Coriander soup at Lent lunches.

As well as volunteering in the village, Joan was locally employed at Salisbury Investment Castings and then in the civil service with Land Command at Wilton, whilst also cleaning and babysitting. She was always active and was a great walker and swimmer, joining Jan Cannons and her good friend Shealagh Fowler on early morning expeditions to swim at Warminster pool. Joan and Shealagh became staunch supporters of Chilmark Cricket Club when it was formed, subsequently being made Honorary members as acknowledgement of their loyal attendance at club matches.

Felicity Pattenden remembers:

Joan was a good singer and signed in at the founding and first meeting of the Hindon & Chilmark Festival Choir in early January 1989; she was a regular and enthusiastic soprano for many years. In 1995 she joined CADS (Chilmark Amateur Drama Society) and went on the boards for the show - Chilmark Remembers - to celebrate the 50th anniversary of VE Day. I always knew when the subsequent funny shows written by John Wilcox were a

success, as I could hear Joan's wonderful roars of laughter from the audience: this was going to be a hit!

Anne McGrail remembers:

It seemed completely appropriate when John Wilcox arranged for Joan Edney to be the Chilmark resident presented to Prince Charles at the unveiling of the Millennium Cross in 2000. She was a real doer in the village, in a low-key way. She was an exceptionally kind person and also very capable. Born to a different generation, I think she would have been quite high powered.

Linda Jones, former Bell Tower Captain of Chilmark Church. writes:

The bellringers of St Margaret's were very sorry to hear that Joan Edney had passed away. She was a loyal ringer and supporter of the Chilmark band for over 34 years, since its inception in 1976/7. As well as attending practice nights, Joan rang the bells regularly for Sunday services and for weddings. She also took part in several Quarter Peals. Joan was Tower Correspondent for the band until she had to give up ringing in 2011 when her health started to decline. Joan was subsequently made an Honorary Life Member of the Salisbury Guild of Ringers. Our thoughts are with her family.

There will be a service in the memory of Joan Edney, followed by the burial of her remains, at St Margaret's, Chilmark, on Friday 4 July, at 3.30pm. All are welcome to attend.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The Annual Meeting of Parishioners took place in St Margaret's on Sunday 18 May, followed immediately by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. PCC Secretary Sir Richard Packer writes:

The biggest issue is the proposed division of the current 14 parish Nadder benefice into two, with Chilmark being in the same new benefice as Tisbury and Fonthill Bishop. Further, the Revd Elaine Brightwell is expected to be the priest allocated to the other benefice which would leave Chilmark with a vacancy. Not only has no progress been made on filling the vacancy but the division of the benefice, originally expected towards the end of last year, has not yet been agreed (by the Church Commissioners). Such is bureaucracy!

Otherwise, there were no major developments in the APCM; we still have no churchwarden; Neil Pattenden and Johan Denekamp were again co-opted to the PCC; and new members were elected in Elizabeth Forbes (of the Forbes Field family) and Ken Brown.'

As part of the garden waste collection service, Wiltshire will compost bark, cut flowers, grass cuttings, hedge clippings, house plants, leaves, shrub prunings, twigs and small branches, untreated sawdust, wood shavings, and weeds. The cost of the service is £75 per bin for a year. Your payment will cover the emptying of one 180 litre bin, every two weeks, until 30 June each year. You may request as many bins as you wish, each charged at the same rate and paid as separate payments:



Chilmark Parish Council Chairman's Report, 2024-25

To start with the overall view, Chilmark is a beautiful location happy to be blessed with many houses built of the local stone made famous by Salisbury cathedral. It is an active place. It has a church, well attended at the major festivals, a cricket club as well as a pub – just rescued. Further, the Reading Room is the home of many activities, there is an annual fete and the Horticultural Society is of long standing, and so on.

I will just touch on the principal issues which have most concerned the PC over the last year: I will put flooding top of my list. The village is positioned geographically such that if there are long periods of heavy rain, the drainage system cannot cope and trouble ensues. The name Frog Lane and the indicator on the Winterbourne of the 1990 flood level show that the problem is of long-standing. In recent years there have been more periods of heavy rain than usual and several householders have suffered as a consequence. In recent years the PC has made determined efforts to improve the situation by persuading Wessex Water to improve the lining of the sewage system, keep ditches, culverts and drains clear and by engaging with local farmers in remedial action, as well as giving practical help with sandbags etc. Our current Flood Warden, Carl Jacobs, has been particularly active. The facts of life mean the possibility of flooding will always be present in Chilmark, but the PC has been and is active in improving matters.

Next, I will turn to the future of the Playing Field and Playground. The shenanigans on this over the last year could fill a book. Skipping most of them, we have now arrived at a position where those responsible for the school are happy to transfer ownership of the Playing Field to the PC without charge, and to repair the fence at their expense before they do so. Thus, in principle, we can see a future where continued public access to the Field at most times is guaranteed and we have the opportunity to construct a Playground with a secure future. All this has been strongly supported by villagers.

Another success story has been Forbes Field. Envisioned by Mungo Melvin a few years ago and put into effect by a large energetic group, including many villagers. A somewhat run down, but well-positioned, field generously left to the PC by a long-term resident, Diana Forbes, has been transformed into a major village asset with open space and many fruit trees with all the costs being met by private donations. We have recently seen the benefits at blossom time.

Last year I referred to concerns over the future of the Black Dog which had closed. Happily, it is now up and running again.

Less satisfactory is the position on Barn Hill parking. The background is that dwellings have been constructed, some by Wiltshire Council, which, with the benefit of hindsight, allowed insufficient provision for parking. Something can be done to increase the provision of parking spaces to a limited extent; and we are pursuing that possibility. Unfortunately, there are some parts of the story which greatly annoy some of those involved, not without justice, and an outcome which leaves everyone happy is difficult to discern.

My final subject is finance. For many years Chilmark's precept — that is the amount collected from you all annually to pay for our activities — was well below that of other comparable local villages. That became increasingly untenable. We have few reserves and expenditure began to reach — or exceed — income. In 2025 we also faced

potential new expenditures on the Playing Field and on a new device for speed measurements on the B3089. We – the PC – concluded that the best way forward would be a one-off large percentage increase in the precept for 2025/26 to remain on top of the situation. Of course, the increase only amounted to a very few thousand pounds in total, but that still has to be paid by you, Council Taxpayers. We discussed the matter openly at two PC meetings and, at our request, the Village Voice also highlighted our intentions. We received no protests about them so we went ahead with the increase. Of course, we hope – and dare I say it expect - to avoid another large percentage increase in precept in the foreseeable future. Sir Richard Packer
