
and bar run by the Chilmark Reading Room committee. World War II period dress is encouraged for the occasion, and prizes will be awarded for best costumes, child & adult, p4.

#### **Food Bank Collection news**

Well Easter has been and gone and our last village contribution of 85kg to the Salisbury Food Bank was greatly appreciated. The collection helped towards the 114 Easter Hampers distributed by the Food Bank. These all contained six meals for a family of four. It is nice to know that 345 children and 228 adults benefited. The initiative was designed to help struggling families over the Easter school holiday. All the hampers included 578 Easter eggs as a treat, along with a recipe sheet to help families plan balanced meals. I thought you may like to see an example from this sheet:

#### Chicken and potato pie

Ingredient list: tinned chicken in white sauce x 2, tinned potatoes x 2, tinned peas x1, tinned sweetcorn x 1

Pre heat oven to 180 degrees or gas mark 4

Pour the chicken in sauce into an oven proof dish. Drain veg and add them to the dish; mix into the chicken in sauce

Drain potatoes and slice up

Place the slices of potatoes on top of the chicken and vegetables

Place in oven on 180 degrees for 25-30 mins or until the potatoes are golden brown and the chicken is hot.

Our next collection will run from Saturday 24 May to Wednesday 28 May. In-date non-perishable goods, please, to be left in the Church by the font for me to collect. Toiletries are also always greatly appreciated. I will let you know nearer the time what the Food bank is short of. A great big thank you again from me and all at the Food Bank.

#### May in the Garden

As bulbs fade, our herbaceous plants are bursting into life. It's time for the Chelsea Chop again – cut back late

flowering perennials like Sedums by a third to a half now, to prevent them flopping later in the summer.

Potato plants are traditionally *earthed up*, this month, which means mounding up soil around the stems as they grow. This protects the shoots from frost damage in late spring and ensures the developing potatoes aren't exposed to light, which turns them green and inedible. It's a simple process – once the shoots are about 23cm (9in) tall, draw soil up around them to form a ridge along the row, leaving just the top 10cm (4in) of the plants visible. As the stems grow taller, repeat the process several times, a few weeks apart. The final height of the ridge should be 20–30cm (8–12in). Follow a similar process for potatoes growing in containers, until the surface reaches 5cm (2 in) below the container rim.

Towards the end of May, when danger of any late frosts is past, summer bedding plants can be planted out in borders, containers and hanging baskets. This is also time to plant out any tender veg like tomatoes, courgettes and cucumbers. Don't forget to open your greenhouse vents and doors on warm days.

May is also a good month to lift and divide any overcrowded clumps of spring bulbs like daffodils. Be careful not to spear bulbs with your garden fork though! **Josie Nunn** 



## Chilmark Cricket Club latest

After weeks of glorious sunshine and relative warmth the season began under grey and chilly conditions at

under grey and chilly conditions at Fonthill on Wednesday 23 April. Rugged up, Chilmark made a brisk start, with George and James *Rocket* Stevenson racing out of the traps. In fact, the father/son pair didn't give anyone else a look in as they shook off the winter cobwebs to post an imposing 179 from the 20 overs. For George it was bittersweet though, as he looked bolted on for a century, only to be left stranded one short when his father accidently hit a boundary while attempting to nurdle a single from the second last ball.

A confident Chilmark took to the field in the second half, with Ricky Corbin (0-26) and Max Allen (0-30) getting the defence under way. However, Fonthill's openers were untroubled as they raced along at ten an over. George Stevenson (0-37), Brand King (0-21) and Ben Eastmond (0-17) all tried to make an impression, but it wasn't until Sam Moss took the ball that wickets fell. Two of them in succession. When an Allen outfield catch brought him a third, and with a reborn Jez Howell (0-21) tying things up at the other end, Chilmark were back in it. Alas, the early damage was terminal, and Fonthill got home with two balls to spare.

Chilmark CC 179-0 (G Stevenson 99\*; J Stevenson 75\*) defeated by Fonthill Park CC 182-3 (S Moss 3-25).

Two days later a resplendent Cleeves Farm hosted The Authors for another T20 game. George Stevenson took the new ball for Chilmark and was at times unplayable. His four overs went for just 14 and came with a peach of a wicket that uprooted the opener's middle stump. Ben Eastmond (0-33) was less successful, but also unlucky, as the Doc dropped a catch at cover. Darren Lee (0-27) rolled his arm over for his first spell of the year and bowled his

first wide. He may have had a first wicket, too, but the Doc dropped the catch at cover. It was Jez Howell (1-35) who got the reward for his off-season training, nipping one into the batsman's stumps. He would have had a second, but the Doc dropped the catch at cover. Practice makes perfect though, and Ricky Corbin was the beneficiary as the ball finally stuck in the Doc's hands. For Corbin it was a 100th wicket for the club, making him just the sixth Chilmark player to reach the milestone. James Stevenson (0-17) kept things tight towards the end, and would have had a wicket, but the Doc dropped the catch at cover.

Chasing 144 for victory, Chilmark got off to a bright start as Brand King hit the first two balls of the innings back down the ground for four. At the other end, Jonny Sanderson (4) was looking good but had no luck as he middled one to the catcher at mid-off. Enter Max Allen. After smashing the ball first into his left foot, and then the right, the Frog Lane native took to smashing it out of the ground. Ten sixes came from his borrowed bat, as the run chase went from nervous, to steady, to comfortable. With King happy to take the singles, Allen raced past his 50 and to the cusp of a century, only to run out of runs to chase as Chilmark secured victory with three overs to spare.

#### **Focus Point**

As May comes in, I wonder how many people have already planned journeys and trips for the summer. Perhaps your choice is to explore somewhere new – a journey into the unknown and exciting, a different culture and climate. Or perhaps you prefer to keep things simple – to revisit friends and special places, secure in the knowledge that you will be met with joy – and, if we are honest, with some new experience there too.

The 'journey' has also become a metaphor to describe our spiritual and emotional progress through life. And for centuries, Christians and people of all faiths have made pilgrimage to particular sites. Perhaps our closest places on the national map would be Shaftesbury – the site of the burial of Edward, King and Martyr – or Salisbury, where the shrine of St Osmund can be found in our Cathedral.

A pilgrimage is a journey of intent. It has, usually, a physical intent. We aim to reach a particular place. We journey often with companions and part of value of the pilgrimage is both in the effort of the journey and in the shared conversations on the way. As I write, we have just completed the 30 or so miles of the St Edward's way with wonderful companions who opened our eyes to so much that we would not have otherwise seen (they also brought the best brownies we have ever eaten!)

But a pilgrimage may also have a specific spiritual dimension. In Medieval times, people would make a journey seeking forgiveness for sins, or for healing for themselves or others. Nowadays, it may be the challenge of the journey, and the value of the time for meditation or prayer that bring a sense of blessing.

It is a healthy thing to expect change. And it is so much easier if we live in the expectation of discovering new things, new places, new aspects of our faith and of the gifts of others. A sense of pilgrimage in life means that we greet every day, every place and every person with a spirit of welcome and a readiness to seek the good.

It's also a healthy thing to build a spirit of contemplation into our daily lives – to set aside time to reflect, to ponder, to pray and to pause. It leads to gratitude.

But most of all, it's an enormous blessing to be given the joy of encounter, with others, with ourselves and with God. I don't think it is any accident that Jesus' ministry was spent walking with others on road and hill and city. So, whether your journey is long or simply to the nearest coffee stop, may every step of your way this Spring be joyful.



More Village History
The article entitled 'Changes in Village Life' by the late Maurice Flower, in the April (2025) issue, prompted requests for more village history pieces. This month we reproduce an article by the late Diana Forbes about John Flower, the son of Maurice Flower:

Memories of John Flower

When we first came to Chilmark in 1930, I was 10 years old, and my brothers were nine and eight. Maurice and Rosalind Flower lived at Cleeves Farm with their two boys, who were younger than us. John was three, and Martin newly born.

Maurice had a fine milking herd of shorthorns, which were brought in twice a day for milking, and the churns collected by lorry. Carthorses were used for working, and John always remembered hearing them from his bed, coming in for work in the morning from the fields, and galloping back down there after work for the night.

John's grandparents James and Lucy lived at Ridge Farm and had a famous flock of Hampshire Down sheep. The ram lambs were often exported to different countries, and buyers came to the farm from many places in this country and abroad. I have seen the prize show certificates displayed on the walls of some of the farm buildings.

Maurice had some good hunt horses at the Cleeves (Cleeves Farm) and used to ride round the farm and go to the local meets as a gentleman farmer in a black coat, as did John. Both Wilton and South & West Wilts (Hunts) bordered Chilmark and used to hunt over their land. remember meets at the Black Dog and Teffont, and of course Fonthill House. John Morrison, later Lord Margadale, was master of the S & WW. As a family we attended the meets and followed on foot. I remember my brothers and I following along Cleeves copses as far as Chicksgrove and finding ourselves on the edge of Tisbury. We did not know where we were but walked up the hill out of Tisbury and finally reached home.

We were invited to tea at Cleeves, and also at Ridge, and played with the Flower boys. My father was invited to shooting parties at both farms and would bring home partridges or pheasants, and sometimes a hare, which we enjoyed.

In early January the shepherds at the Ridge (I think they were Mr Batchelor and Mr Taylor) would build lambing pens of hurdles thatched with straw, to shelter the ewes and lambs. These were often on Fonthill Hill above Ridge Farm. We used to be invited to see the lambs. The shepherds would sleep up there in a hut at night to look after the lambing ewes.

When the war broke out in 1939, John was still at school. He joined the army in 1944, aged 17, straight from school. He went out to India and Singapore, which he always remembered very vividly, and came back with many photographs, which the family still have. Strangely enough, he met Maurice Jeanes, another Chilmark young man, on a transport flight when out there. Maurice was a bell ringer and had joined the Air Force. Martin (Flower) was still at school.

One of my brothers, Andrew, joined the Navy, and Colin joined the Home Guard under Colonel Marshall Smith. They sometimes used to stay out on watch all night above Cleeves Farm, where there was a good view all round. He was later called up into the Army and joined the Engineers and was sent out to India. I went to college at Ambleside to train as a teacher.

After the war, John married Sally, and they lived at Ridge. After James died, Lucy went to live at Manora with her two daughters Muriel and Vera. Lucy lived to a great old age 104. She used to ask my father to play chess with her.

John and Sally had two daughters, Stella and Tessa. When Stella was old enough to start lessons, John asked me if I would teach her, as I was home at that time, and also her friend Fiona Morrison and others joined us. I had a little class at Chilmark House. Other younger children wanted to join and so Mrs Keen had a kindergarten class in one of our upstairs bedrooms. At the end of every term we invited the parents to see the children's work. We followed the PNEU (Parent National Educational Union) programmes and exams. The children would read aloud and recite poems and pieces of Bible to their parents. Later on, Stella and Tessa went to a larger school in Gillingham.

Sadly, Sally had a weak heart and died while the children were still quite young. Sally's mother helped to look after

the children. Later, John married Wendy and they brought up Stella and Tessa and their younger family, Karen, Wayne and Dean at Ridge Farm.

John always regularly attended Chilmark Church and would bring his children. He read the lessons from time to time. In later years he would help the priest at Holy Communion. Sadly, a few years ago he developed diabetes and heart failure, and died on 14 June at the age of 79. We all miss him very much. He had a wonderful Funeral, with a church full of relations and friends who were invited afterwards to a service and refreshments at the Ridge.

I remember that John and Wendy once had a big lunch party at the Ridge. We all sat round tables and had a sumptuous hot lunch and a sweet. There were lovely paintings of Stella and Tessa on their ponies on the wall amongst other pictures.

John's father Maurice had many interesting stories of the old days. Once there was a big party at the Ridge. When it was time to go home, one of the guests asked for his horse to be brought round to the front. They said they were sorry it had disappeared. It was found in the loft above the stable! The children had built a hill of straw bales, and led it up, then taken away the bales. It could not be brought down till the next day, so the guest had to stay the night!

When we were young the Flowers had a pony called Jim, for the boys to ride. Sometimes they would lend Jim to my father so he could lead me out. Jim was quite excitable. I remember being kicked off on the down at the end of the Manor Farm Lane. My father had Jim on a long leading rein attached to his head collar. He held on to it, and Jim cantered on downhill towards home, dragging my father face down on the grass. He managed to stop the pony and put me on again.

When I was older, the Flowers lent me their hunters to exercise. They were always well corned up, and I used to get run away with on the downs but never came to any harm. Vera Flower had a lovely mare Kittiwake, which she lent me when I was about 14. I rode her up to Lady Down. When on the grass track, Kittiwake set off around the common (as it then was) at a canter. I came off near the road but was helped on again by a passing labourer, and Kittiwake took me safely home.

When John and Sally first came to the Ridge, John had a lovely hunter called Robin to ride around and hunt on. He always kept ponies for the children to ride. After Sally died, he gave up pedigree sheep but continued with sheep for some years until it became wholly arable. Martin ran Cleeves Farm for some time. He married and they had two children, Graham and Stephanie. Sadly, they later divorced and the farm was sold. Martin kept in touch with John and was at his funeral.

When Dean was growing up, we had a Boys Club in the village, which he joined. John used to help sometimes in the club with games. In the summer he would sometimes ask the children up to swim in their pool. He had made a swimming pool in their garden at the Ridge.

The Flowers owned a Chicken Farm up the hill above the Black Dog, to the left of the Wylye Road on the bridle path leading across the A303 to Stockton Wood. For many years it was run by Mr and Mrs Spencer. Sadly, they lost their son James in the war. His name is on the War Memorial in the churchyard. They had a married daughter. When Mr Spencer died, his widow went to a home in Salisbury. Maurice and John used to visit her.

When the Chicken Farm was let, or sold as a private house, John wanted to make a well there which meant making a very deep bore hole. He asked my brother Colin, a geologist, for advice. Colin said he would have to go as deep down as the Greensand layer below the chalk. This was the same as the Greensand layer by the Ridge Lane. John was grateful, and the well was a success, but it was necessary to drill to 600ft.

In the war Rose Dennis, who had worked at Chilmark House for my mother, had to join the Land Army. She then worked at the Flower's Chicken Farm. Once, something startled my horse up there and I came off, but Rose saw me get safely on again!

In Chilmark Church there is a list on the wall of those who came safely back from the war. On it are John Flower, my two brothers Andrew and Colin Forbes, and Maurice Jeanes. John, Andrew and Maurice have now passed on.

When John and Martin were away at boarding school, Rosalind and Maurice had another baby, a little girl they called Janet. As she got older, she asked to ride her pony all over the farm and sometimes down to Teffont to have him shod by Mr Ball, the old blacksmith. I was told that Maurice kept the bridle path open for that reason. Janet grew up to be a very beautiful woman. She was married at Stone Dial (Dial House, Becketts Lane) where Maurice moved when Martin married and took over Cleeves. Rosalind had a lovely garden at Stone Dial. Her gardener was Harry Jay, whom she shared with my parents. The Jays lived in Rose Cottage.

John had always been ready to help when I needed help or advice about the land or village. When I left boarding school in Autumn 1937 at age 17, Rosalind was running the WI in the village. They had meetings once a month in the Reading Room. I remember going to Cleeves to practise some songs with the WI members. Rosalind was a very good pianist and had a grand piano in her drawing room.


